Genealogy is full of surprises!

Icelandic genealogist Oddur F. Helgason became interested in President Donald J. Trump's lineage after speculation about Trump's potential kinship to Icelandic leaders went viral on Facebook. His findings: President Trump and Icelandic President Guðni Th. Jóhannesson are distant cousins.

Going back over 25 generations, Helgason believes the common ancestor is none other than King Hakon V who ruled Norway from 1299-1319. Leif Erikson Day-October 9

Nordic stories passed through the ages tell us of the Viking, Leif Erikson, and his explorations across the North Atlantic. One of the most daring of the great Norse adventurers, he may have been the first European to discover our continent. Scandinavian tales tell us of a cargo of timber and wild grapes he brought from North America to his home in Greenland more than four centuries before Columbus. Above all, Leif Erikson was an explorer and he has come to symbolize mankind's efforts to push back his frontiers, master the elements, and conquer his fear of the unknown. In honoring him, and in honoring the Nordic people whose achievements have continuously enriched the Western World, we also honor the act of discovery. As a mark of respect to the courage of Leif Erikson and his Viking followers, the



Congress of the United States, by joint resolution approved September 2, 1964 (78 Stat. 849, USC 169C), authorized the President to proclaim October 9 in each year as LEIF ERIKSON

Oktoberfest —-Norwegian Style

As we welcome the coming of autumn, October brings the changing color of the leaves, cooler temperatures and in many parts of the country, the early signs of winter. Pumpkin patches appear, corn mazes abound and the haunted houses call out for the next brave soul. We celebrate the discoveries of Leif Ericksen and Christopher Columbus. And on Halloween we pass out treats to all the goblins and fairy princesses who come knocking at our door. And in the midst of this all is Oktoberfest – as if anyone needs an excuse to have a beer.



Which made me wonder, does Norway celebrate Oktoberfest? Indeed they do. Most Oktoberfest celebrations begin in mid-September. In Sweden, the Beer and Whisky festival is held the last 2 weekends in September in Stockholm. In Denmark, the old Carlsberg site at Valby in Copenhagen will be the venue for Europe's largest beer festival, appropriately named the "European Beer Festival"! And in Norway I found an interesting Oktoberfest beginning on October 11th at the Youngstorget in Oslo. Which brings up the question, what beer do Norwegians drink?

Back in the day, most farms had their own brewery. Beer was not only a natural part of all celebrations, funerals and feasts, but it was also a part of everyday life. It is speculated by anthropologists that beer was consumed regularly in part because people ate so much salted fish and meat. Beer acted as a diuretic, aiding the body in getting rid of all excess salt. In the 17th and 18th centuries, brewing was actually mandatory for all land owners. Failure to brew before Christmas would result in heavy fines and failure to brew for several seasons would result in loss of land and livestock. It

fines and failure to brew for several seasons would result in loss of land and livestock. It was in the mid 1800's that commercial brewing became common in Norway. In 1857 there were 353 breweries in Norway. Fifty years later, there were only 40 and by 1996 only 7 breweries were in operation.





Today the Norwegian beer market is dominated by two large brewers:

The giant Carlsberg-Ringnes based in Oslo and Copenhagen, Denmark, and the smaller Hansa-Borg, based in Bergen and Sarpsborg. And in recent years, craft breweries are becoming popular. Unfortunately, taxes on beer are the highest in the world in Norway. So whether you prefer the light pilsner or enjoy the much darker malt beer known as juleøl at Christmas, may I recommend the top three as rated by Øl Akademi: Ringnes' Julebokk 2018 (dark lager) Færder's Færder Røkelse (stout) Haandbryggeri's Fatlagret Bestefar (traditional beer) Skål!


