


Manager, "We have made our decision not on the correct answers, but on the question you got wrong." Irishman, "And just how would one incorrect answer be better than another"?

#### RECIPE

### Mors Grov Brod

This recipe for *Mother's Graham Bread* was published years ago in a Sons of Norway *Scandinavian Cook Book* my mother used to make traditional favorites. There was nothing better than the scent of her freshly baked bread, except the taste of a warm slice slathered with salty butter!



Spring weather can be unpredictable, so this delicious bread can be served with a warming bowl of soup on a chilly day, or with lighter fare like a salad. The recipe makes 4 medium loaves—enough to share a loaf or two.

1 cake compressed yeast
4 cups lukewarm water, divided
1/2 cup molasses
1 Tbsp. salt
1/2 cup melted butter or shortening, plus additional to grease 4 bread pans
3 Tbsp. melted butter, reserved
6 cups white flour
2 cups graham flour
1/2 cup sugar

Dissolve yeast in 1/2 cup of lukewarm water; let stand 15 minutes. Add 3 1/2 cups lukewarm water, molasses, salt, sugar and 1/2 cup melted butter or shortening. Add enough flour to make a soft sponge. Beat thoroughly for about 10 minutes, then add the rest of the flour to make a stiff dough. Knead dough, then place in a greased bowl, cover and set in a warm place. When the dough has doubled in bulk, knead again. Let rise once more, then shape into 4 loaves and place in greased pans. Let rise until light (the bread will come to the top of the pan or slightly higher). Bake about 45 minutes in a moderate oven (350 degrees Fahrenheit or 175 degrees Celsius). Brush tops with reserved melted butter. Vær så god!

Ed.: I have this cookbook, white with green lettering, as it used to be given to new members by different lodges in the Order and was advertised in the supply catalog from Headquarters. It came from a Publishing Company in Lake Mills, Iowa. The stave church on the cover is the Borgund Stavekirke.

## Easter (påske) is a rather long holiday in Norway.

Schools are usually closed for the entire week preceding Easter. The Wednesday before Easter is the last working day, when people stock up on supplies and alcohol, as most stores close for the long weekend. Traditionally, shops and workplaces are closed over Maundy Thursday (skjærtorsdag), Good Friday (langfredag), and the Monday following Easter Sunday (påskedag), known as second Easter Day (andre påskedag). Easter is one of the most important holidays for Christians, and many Easter services are held in the Norwegian Church during this time. Good Friday is one of the three days a year the TV stations do not put commercial ads on TV – they show charity ads instead.

For Norwegians, Easter is all about the end of winter, the return of the sun, and the arrival of spring. Focus on spending time with family and friends is particularly important. Yellow is an immensely popular color after a long and dark winter, and many people like to buy daffodils, tulips, and other colorful flowers.

Homes are decorated in yellow and green, and on Palm Sunday (palmesøndag), birch tree twigs (to

represent the palms) are brought into the house and hung with painted eggs and other Easter decorations. Yellow candles and flowers are popular, and favorite activities include painting eggs, sewing ornaments, and making cards.

Nearly everyone looks forward to the Easter holiday (påskeferien). The days are getting longer, and spring is on the way. Many Norwegians travel to their cabins to go skiing, go hiking, or indulge in other snow sports, as the snow is good, and the weather is sunny. The brown skin tone one gets after long outdoor days and sunbathing in the mountain air and snow rich environments, are often called "Easter brown."

Favorite snacks while out on the mountains (and at home) are oranges, Kvikk Lunsj chocolates, and Solo soft drinks. Over 20 million oranges and 18 million Kvikk Lunsj bars are eaten at Easter each year! Easter is indeed time for chocolate...and do not forget Easter marzipan!

Norwegians also enjoy many other Easter traditions. One popular activity is decorating Easter eggs (påskeegg). Another fun tradition is the Easter egg hunt (påskeeggjakt). The adults fill colorful Easter eggs with candy and hide them around the house or in the yard for the children to find.



A bountiful breakfast is in order, with pancakes and eggs the key players – the latter in various formats from fried, scrambled, or poached to boiled then painted or dyed. Did you know, during Easter the Norwegians eat approximately 30 million eggs? (The country's population is around 5.2 million.) You will also find various types of breads, cheeses, hams, seafood, and spreads.

The traditional dinner could be Easter lamb (påskelam), fish, or sometimes ham accompanied by boiled potatoes and vegetables, not forgetting an Easter beer (påskeøl). Or dinner could be grilled hot dogs (pølser) at the cabin.


Perhaps one of the most exciting traditions of the Easter holiday is the Easter crime (påskekrim) phenomenon. Many crime novels come out this time of year, and there are also many crime series on TV.

Further north, in Kautokeino, you will find the Sami people celebrating with the Sami Easter Festival, which showcases music, film, art, and traditional handicrafts called duodji, alongside lassoing, a snow-scooter cross, and the World Reindeer Racing Championships.



Easter Monday is known as second Easter Day (andre påskedag). It is the end of the Easter holidays and is about cleaning, clearing, and returning home, ready for the second semester.
